God-Centric Living

"Mirror, mirror on the wall" What do I see when I see me? Self-concept, self-image is important. We must be comfortable with who we are spiritually. And if we are not, we need to change. Today is the time to ask some questions about life and how it's to be lived. For instance, our culture is into me-centric thinking. We cultivate our own agendas instead of God's will in our life. We've gotta ask: "Who am I? Am I me-centric or God-Centric?

Living God-Centric lives demands we ask some serious questions about what is right and wrong for me?...

Does the Bible say it's wrong? If the Bible says something is wrong, there is no way to make it right. Rationalization is "in" today. But no amount of human thinking can change truth. King Saul rationalized that it was okay to disobey God if it was to glorify Him. Samuel responded: "To obey is better than sacrifice, and to heed is better than the fat of rams." He is saying, the end doesn't justify the means. If the Bible condemns a practice, it can't be justified by human reasoning. Existentialism, situation ethics are of Satan.

Will it harm my body? God lives in us: "We know this by the Spirit He gave us. Do you not know that your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God? You are not your own; you were bought with a price. Therefore, glorify God with your body."

Will it impair my mind? The Bible not only tells us how to live, it tells us what to think. Solomon wrote, "As a man thinks in his heart, so is he." Jesus said, "out of the *heart come the issues of life."* Paul admonishes: "*Finally* brethren, whatsoever things are true, honest, just, pure, lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things."


Will this enslave me? Paul writes: "Everything is permissible, but not everything is beneficial. Everything is permissible, but we must not be mastered, brought under the power of any." God doesn't want us enslaved to anyone or anything but Him. God must rule as Lord and King over every arena of life!



Is this proper stewardship? By participating in this thought or practice, am I being a good steward of my time, talent, treasure, energy and truth, His truth? Scripture tells us that "As stewards of God's blessings, that we be found faithful."

Does this practice glorify God? "Whatever you do. in word or deed. do all in the name of the Lord." Christ should always be exalted whether in life or death. We must ask the mirror: "Does my latest agenda glorify me or God?" If an attitude or behavior can't help us in some way to glorify Him, perhaps we ought to rethink it.

Will it profit and edify others? The Hebrews' writer admonishes, "Let us consider how to stimulate one another to love and good works." Paul is found saying: "Even as I try to please everybody in every way.



ing my own good, but the good of many, so that they may be saved" (1 Corinthians 10.33). Not one of us is an island, we influence oth-

ers by the way we think and behave. Paul contends that "no man lives and dies to himself."

Is it worth imitating? "Mirror, mirror, does my thinking and behavior cause others to live God pleasing lives?" "Do I want my weaker brother or my children doing what I am about to do?" "Will it enhance their lives and bring them closer to God?" Paul says, "That which is not done in faith is sin" "Follow me as I follow Christ."

Is it best? For too long we've asked the question: What's wrong with this? Wrong question! It should be: Is this the best thing? Is this the excellent thing to do? God is not asking us to do the mediocre or the mundane, but the excellent. Lukewarmness, status-quo, mediocre is never pleasing to our God. Instead, we are to "love Him with all our *heart, all our soul, all our mind and strength.*" All our being!

Well, how do we apply these suggestions?

• Go ahead, look in the mirror. Do it often. Self examination is a biblical concept. Lamentation 3.40 reads, "Let us test and examine our ways..." Paul says, "Examine yourselves, to see whether you are in the faith."

• Make a decision to do better. Nothing happens until we decide to make it happen.

• Ask ourselves honestly, can we improve our lives by adopting these concepts?

• Obtain good counsel. Seek out godly men and women who can help us decide what's best. Don't ask just anybody! Find the most God-like individual you know and ask for help.

• Ask for God's help. "God is patient, not willing that any should perish." He is always ready to help us do what is right.

• Evaluate the results. Are we closer to God because we've adopted these beliefs and behaviors? Are we having a more positive influence on others?

Remember: thoughts determine actions, actions determine habits, habits determine lifestyle, lifestyle determines destiny.

I hope you find these suggestions helpful as we strive to become the people and person that God has called us to be.

A Worthwhile Read

The Bible is an indispensable companion for a will lived life. It is an entire library in only one volume. It contains sixty-six books, 1,189 chapters, 31,102 verses, 773,746 words and 3,566,480 letters, depending on the translation used.

The motivated reader can read the Old Testament in only a couple of weeks, about 74 hours. Sixty-four verses a day will take an average reader through it in one year.

The New Testament will take the same reader less than a week. 18.5 hours, only 28 minutes a day will complete it in forty days, 36 minutes a day will finish in 31 days.

All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking. correcting and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work. 
God's word holds the universe's great truths and answers. But it also holds the answers to little things that can plague the lives of ordi-
