Family & Friends..... January 6th, 2021





Seeing God In 2021

As I put this issue of Lifelines together, I want to say something about the New Year and our responsibility to it. So please read it with this thought in mind.

We start by asking: What is our view of God? What kind of relationship do we have with Him? The New Year is not gonna be what it could be if we have a distorted view of our creator. For instance: Some see God as their conscience. that small inner voice, which convicts us of wrong, instilling guilt. Others see Him as a cosmic Santa Claus, One who exists solely for the purpose of satisfying our wants and wishes. Still others see Him as a celestial policeman, One who is waiting for us to do wrong so He can punish. Where do we find a proper view? "The one and only, who is at the Father's side, has made Him known." Jesus came to show us God...

See Him as a friend. Solomon writes: "There's a friend who sticks closer than a brother" (Proverbs 19.24). God is a friend that never fails us. As a friend He knows the problems with which we struggle. "My God and I go in the fields together, we walk and talk as good friends should and do; we clasp our hands, our voices ring with laughter, my God and I walk through the meadow's hue" Let us decide to day to make 2021 the year that we cultivate a closer friendship with Him.

God is our Shepherd. In the 23rd Psalm, David acknowledges God as his guide, counselor, comforter, provider, protector, sustainer. God uses His resources to care for, heal, discipline, and comfort us. He blesses us in this life; then brings us home to live with Him. As a shepherd, God never withholds anything that is good for us. Resolutions are proper, but the most important resolve is that we submit to His shepherding.

See God as our Father. Jesus came teaching the fatherhood of God, saying: He is My Father, your Father. Pray like this, "our Father." Think of the comfort that comes from knowing that the creator, sustainer, provider, protector of the universe is our Father. He has our best interest at heart. He knows our needs, hears our prayers. Even when we don't know what we need or how to ask, He supplies. As a Father, He "works all things out to our benefit" ... "Every good and perfect gift comes down from the Father."

God is our Savior. I think too many of us have



exiled God and His work to the past. We see Him working in the lives of Abraham, Moses, Ruth, Mary, Peter, Paul, Timothy, and Titus; but we fail



to see Him as a present reality in our own lives. God's redemptive power is alive and at work today. John 3.16 is still true. God still loves the world. He still saves those who believe on Jesus as His Son. "In Him we have redemption through His blood, even the forgive-

ness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace" (Ephesians 1.7). Isn't it time to name Jesus, God in the flesh, as our Savior? What better time than in the beginning of a New Year?

He is a God of all comfort. Listen! I know we struggle with what happens to us in life, thinking "Why Me Lord?" But God is not out to harm us, but to mature us into the people and person He wants us to be: "Consider it pure joy, my brothers, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith develops perseverance. Perseverance must finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything" (James 1.2-4).

What is our view of God? As the New Year gets underway, may we daily enjoy the relationship we have with Him; seeing Him as our Friend, Shepherd, Father and Comfort? Amen?

Character

"My Heart is fixed, O God, my Heart is fixed" (Psalm 57:7)

Here is something else to consider as we enter a new year: Character is the real you, what you know you are, not what others think you are. As Abraham Lincoln put it, "Character is like a tree and reputation like its shadow. The shadow is what we think of it, the tree is the real thing." It is the sum total of what you are after you have won all, and the sole thing left after you have lost all. Only what we, with God's help, have wrought into our character during life, can we take with us. Characters are achieved, not received. It has been called the "perfectly educated will." "Good character," someone has said, "is that quality which makes one dependable whether being watched or not, which makes one truthful when it is to one's advantage to be a little less than truthful, which makes one courageous when faced with great obstacles, which endows one with the firmness of wise self-discipline" Every man or woman is the architect of his or her own character. David Thomas has pointed out that the primary element of man's character is his "controlling disposition." He further states the fact that this principle of character is like the sap of a tree—it runs into every branch of life, and produces, shapes and colors every part. Our character is being formed each day by our thoughts, attitudes, and actions. It is not made in crisis, only exhibited.

Campbell, in his debate with Rice, was right on target when he said, "When any matter, however minute, involves principle, or character, it ceases to be an unimportant affair."


