## **Mountaintop Experiences**

Scripture records several people experiencing big, dramatic moments that happen up on the mountain. There are plenty of these mountaintop experiences recorded for us. Let's take a few minutes and look at just three.

In Genesis 22, Abraham is instructed by God to take his son, his only son, Isaac, to the mountains of Moriah and offer him as a sacrifice. Abraham and Isaac make the trek up the mountain. They build the altar. Abraham binds Isaac and just as he is about to sacrifice his only son, God shows up. Abraham's arm is stayed and God provides a ram.

It would be hard to talk about mountaintop experiences without mentioning Moses receiving the Law on Mt. Sinai. Moses ascends a mountain that only a few days prior had been enveloped in smoke, had experienced and earthquake and was subjected to the thunderous voice of God. Moses climbs that mountain and after 40 days meets with God face to face as God give him instructions for Israel as to how they could be his people. It is on this same mountain that Moses gets a glimpse of the glory of God as he meets with God to beg forgiveness for Israel after the Golden Calf incident.

Peter, James, and John share a mountaintop experience as they witness the transfiguration of Jesus. They see Jesus radiant with glory as he talks with Moses and Elijah. It is here on this mountain that they hear the voice of God say, "This is my beloved son with whom I am well pleased; listen to him." (Matthew 17:5)

Mountaintop experiences; we have probably experienced them. We look for them. They come, but in our view they are often gone far too quickly, and we are left searching for the next one. What makes those spiritual mountaintop experiences so great? Often, it is because we only get to the top of the mountain after having gone through the valleys.





It is hard for me to imagine the valley of emotions through which Abraham went on his way up the mountain with Isaac. He had been following the lead of God for decades by this point in his life. For the first 25 years he had been told of that God would give him and Sarah a son. It had finally happened, and now God is asking for him to take this son, the son of promise, the son of the covenant, and sacrifice him. What kind of God does that? Can God give him another son at this stage of the game? Can God be trusted? The valley of the shadow of doubt must have been pretty dark for Abraham.

Then there is Moses. God called Moses from the same mountain to go and lead Israel out of Egypt to the land he had sworn to give to Abraham's descendants. Now Moses is back. Think of all he had witnessed in the meantime. There were the plagues, the multiple meetings and negotiations with Pharaoh, the Passover, and the parting of the Red Sea. He had seen God provide food and water for this huge nation of recently freed slaves. He had listened to their complaining. He was in the very presence of God begging that the Israelites be forgiven of this sin of building a golden calf. The valley of the shadow of difficulty was something Moses had to navigate.

The transfiguration witnessed by Peter, James and John came on the heels of Jesus teaching that to be his follower meant picking up a cross and following him. Although they had yet to go through their darkest valleys, Jesus tells them that the radiance and the beauty of mountaintop experiences follow the darkness and suffering that are in the valley. Jesus teaches and demonstrates that the glory of the resurrection follows the despair of the cross.

Mountaintop experiences are as awesome as they are because of what happens in the valleys. In the valley we meet God and learn to follow his lead. We find the One who walks with us, cares for us, and leads us to deeper trust and reliance on him. David sums this up well in Psalm 23 when he writes, "Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for your are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me." (Psalm 23:4)

Valleys in our lives seem much more frequent than the peaks for most of us. While we love the time spent on the mountaintop; while we love to soak up those moments and all of their breathtaking beauty, we need to remember to thank God for his presence with us in the valleys. It is in the valleys where we feel the presence of God and learn more of who he is and of his great love and care for us.

## **Nearer My God to Thee**

"Therefore submit to God.
Resist the devil and he will flee from you.
Draw near to God and He will draw near to you."
(James 4:7-8)

Sarah Flower Adams was a 19thcentury English poet who authored several Christian hymns. She is best known for the beautiful and meaningful hymn, Nearer My God to Thee. This hymn has a rich heritage. It was the favorite hymn of President William McKinley, who was assassinated in September 1901. It reportedly brought him a great deal of comfort as he lay dying. According to Dr. M. D. Mann, the attending physician, McKinley sang softly the words of the song and said, "This has been my constant prayer." On September 19, 1901, the day of McKinley's funeral, Nearer My God to Thee was sung in his memory throughout all the land in congregations both large and small. The song seems to project a sense of difficult times in cross bearing and probably end of life experiences, but we need to draw nearer to God at all times. It goes without saying, the faithful Christian near death's door will be nearer to God than ever before, and will find a great deal of comfort and solace in that thought. But the thrust of this article is the need to draw nearer to God continually in all of life. The approach is basically this: "Draw near to God and He will draw near to you."

Draw near to God. It is not a difficult thing to do! After explaining to the Athenians what the great creative power of God had wrought, Paul then said: "God did this so that men would seek Him and perhaps reach out for Him and find Him, though he is not far from each one of us. For in Him we live and move and have our being." (Acts 17:27-28) God is there. He is always near! We just need to reach out to Him! Draw near! Feel His presence! Everywhere you look in nature you see the signature of God: The starry heavens, beautiful plants and flowers, unique animal life, wondrous ocean life, majestic mountain peaks, radiant sunrises and sunsets, just to mention a few things with God's signature. Nature has been called "the garment of the living God." Acknowledge Him! Accept Him! Believe Him! Seek Him! Tennyson wrote:

"Only that which made us, meant us to be mightier by and by, Set the sphere of all the boundless heavens within the human eye, Sent the shadow of Himself, the boundless through the human soul, Boundless inward, in the atom, boundless outward in the whole." The more one knows about God the more one will want to seek Him and draw near to Him. Let us all join in with David as he speaks of God: "You are forgiving and good, O Lord, abounding in love to all who call to you. Hear my prayer, O Lord; listen to my cry for mercy. In the day of my trouble I will call to you, for you will answer me. Among the gods there is none like You, O Lord; no deeds can compare with Yours. For You are great and do marvelous deeds; You alone are God." (Psalm 86:5-8,10)

From the song of Moses and Miriam recorded in Exodus 15, we read: "Who among the gods is like You, O Lord? Who is like You, majestic in holiness, awesome in glory, working wonders?" (verse 11)

God is good! David wrote: "For the Lord is good; His mercy is everlasting, and His truth endures to all generations." (Psalm 100:5)

Our God is faithful! "Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for His compassion never fails. They are new every morning; great is Your faithfulness." (Lamentations 3:22-23) In Paul's closing exhortations to the Thessalonians he wrote: "He who calls you is faithful." (I Thessalonians 5:24)

Nearer My God to Thee is reputed to be the final piece played by the eight musicians on the Titanic as it sank into the ocean on April 14, 1912. Perhaps it brought comfort, strength and peace to some of those on board.

Life is brief, like a vapor that appears for a little time and then vanishes away. It is like a snowflake on the river, a moment seen and then lost forever, or a minute valley between two mountain peaks of eternity.

Should we not all make Nearer My God to Thee our constant aim and prayer?
