#### **Wisdom In Humility**

Now he told a parable to those who were invited, when he noticed how they chose the places of honor, saying to them, "When you are invited by someone to a wedding feast, do not sit down in a place of honor, lest someone more distinguished than you be invited by him, and he who invited you both will come and say to you. 'Give your place to this person,' and then you will begin with shame to take the lowest place. But when you are invited, go and sit in the lowest place, so that when your host comes he may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher.' Then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at table with you. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted." (Luke 14:7-11 ESV)

This particular parable of Jesus doesn't get a lot of attention as compared with some of the others he uses. It is certainly not as well known as parables such as The Good Samaritan, or The Prodigal Son, or The Parable of the Sower, but it has a lot to say to us if we will listen.

On the surface it seems to be Jesus giving instruction on how to behave if one is invited to a banquet. The parable is, after all, directed at the guests who all seem to compete for positions of honor at this particular banquet. As we make our way through life in our current culture, we see more and more the need for lessons on etiquette. But, there is much more for us to reflect on than just a basic lesson in manners. This parable

shows us that wisdom is found in humility.

Wisdom is defined as, the quality or state of being wise; knowledge of what is true or right coupled with just judgment as to action; sagacity, discernment, or insight. This definition reminds me of something I once heard about the difference between efficiency and effectiveness. Efficiency is how quickly we climb the ladder of success; effectiveness is making sure



the ladder is leaned against the correct wall.

We all have within us the desire to be noticed and appreciated. There seems to be a basic need that we have for others to think well of us and to admire us. We see this in our kids when they are small. As they learn to do more and more things, we hear them shout, "Hey, look at me!" "Watch what I can do!" They want to be noticed and to be noticed immediately.

As adults we struggle to grow out of that habit. We want to be noticed. We want to be appreciated. We also learn that there are more subtle ways to accomplish these goals than shouting to those around us. Like the guests of banquet choosing the seats of honor, we can position ourselves in places where we are more likely to be noticed. That is a very efficient way of achieving the goal. The problem is in its effectiveness. Are we being noticed by the right people, or in our case, the right One? Or are we simply pleasing ourselves?

Our desire should be to be noticed and honored by God alone. In other words what God thinks of us, being honored enough to be used in his service as his instruments, should be our aim. To that end, Jesus again gives us great direction. He tells the guests to take the lower position and then let the host arrange them as he sees fit.

We need to be willing to let God make the seating arrangements. What if we were to let God use us where he wants us? We are all gifted and equipped in different ways. Paul points out this fact as he addresses the church in Rome in Romans 12:3-8 when he gives us the picture as the church as a body with many members. Each member has a role to play if the body is to be healthy and sound. We all have strengths and we all have weaknesses, and thank God those are not the same for each member. The challenge for each of us is to soberly examine ourselves and identify our gifts, and then offer those gifts to God for his use in conjunction with the gifts of other members.

Living this way calls for humility. This will push us out of our comfort zones. Letting God use us according to what he wants to accomplish rather than our own preferences may not give us the immediate result that we think we should achieve. It demonstrates our trust in the One who knows what is best and consistently works for our good and his glory. It allows God to exalt us rather than trying to promote ourselves. It will have our focus in the right direction. It will confirm that our ladder is against the correct wall. In the end, the goal is for all to have a place at God's table. May we be humble enough to submit to his wisdom as to the best way to achieve the goal.

- \* Be of the same mind,
- \* Be like minded.

The glue to fix our broken world is found in thinking like Jesus. We must think as he thought, talk as he talked, act as he acted, react to people and life's circumstances as he reacted. Having the mind of Christ means we will live as he lived. Isn't that exciting? Do you want your religion, your faith, to come alive in an exciting life-style? Then live like Jesus.

We must have a heart of humility. Who, being in the very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, hoarded, held onto, but made himself nothing. Humility is a willingness to submit to God's will. Humility is our willingness to say, "Thy will be done." Humility is a willingness to become nothing for the sake of others, a willingness to place the interests of others before our own. Humility is treating others, regardless of skin color, social status or religious preference as God treats us.

Taking the very nature of a servant. The heart of Jesus was that of a servant. In His ministry, we see Him; healing the sick, casting out devils, calming the storms in people's lives, forgiving the woman caught in adultery,

teaching the woman at the well, restoring Zaccheaus.

Genuine servanthood is serving others when we don't have the time, when it's not convenient, or when we would rather be doing something else. Servanthood is doing things for others when it's really someone else's responsibility.

- \* Husbands, have the mind of Christ, serve your wife and children.
- \* Wives, have the mind of Jesus, submit to your husband.
- \* Children, have the heart of Jesus, care for your parents.
- \* Preachers, teachers, deacons, elders, have the attitude of Jesus, serve the church.
- \* Christian friend, have the values of Christ, serve others, even your enemies.

Think about it, wouldn't this attitude of Christ cure the ills of our nation, families, and churches? Of course! Wouldn't this attitude fix our Humpty Dumpty world?

Jesus had a mind of love and obedience. And He being found in appearance of a man, humbled Himself and becoming obedient to death, even death on the cross. Jesus struggled in the garden with the will of God, but in the final analysis it was what? Not My will, but thine be done. Aren't we glad Jesus became obedient? If Jesus had not been obedient, our world would be in terrible trouble, and we would be eternally lost.

Now God calls us to love and obedience.
