What Do We Expect?

Just prior to his ascension, Jesus told his disciples to wait in Jerusalem until they received the promised Holy Spirit. Once that happened they were to be his witnesses, telling the people about the hope and the future that is available because of the crucified and resurrected Messiah. They were to be about the work of making disciples and baptizing new believers. This message of good news was theirs to carry all over the globe. So, they waited just as they were instructed.

They didn't, however, just sit back and do nothing. While they were waiting, this little band of followers – the eleven remaining apostles and other devoted men and women – prayed and prepared. Acts 1:14 says they "were devoting themselves to prayer." In Acts 1:15-26 we read the narrative of the Apostles appointing someone to fill the place in their group that was left by Judas. They waited expectantly. They truly believed that God was at work; that Jesus would send them the Holy Spirit just as promised, and they wanted to be ready to move when God acted. Their devotion to the mission of God can be seen all through the book of Acts as they continue to follow God's lead and trust that he is working to reconcile the world to himself. They believed that Jesus would do just as he said he would do. They believed that the Holy Spirit would guide, lead and work to transform their lives and the lives of others. They lived expectantly.

I hope that this is not something that we have let get away from us as disciples of Jesus. I pray that we always remember that God is still at work. Jesus is alive and well. and that the Holy Spirit still guides, leads and transforms. I hope that we expect Jesus to return just as he said he would.

Do we expect God to be involved in our interactions with others? Each day we come in contact with other people. Our lives intersect



with others at various points and in various places. Do we look for God's hand in this? Think of the overwhelmed parent we meet at a school activity, or the person we see at the grocery store who appears to be stressed about whether or not they can pay for what they need, or maybe the coworker who is experiencing tension at home. Do we see these as divine appointments and opportunities to offer a word of encouragement or to share the love of Jesus? Or do we see these as obstacles to navigate so that we can get on with our day? Do we expect God to work in these situations?

Do we expect God to be involved in the growth of the church? If so, what are we doing to get ready for what he is about to do? In March of 2020, our elders made the decision to go to two services on Sunday mornings to make room for growth. We believed that God was working and we wanted to be ready when he acted. We still believe that, still expect that God is working, that Jesus is alive and well, and that the Holy Spirit still guides, leads and transforms.



Living expectantly is something that we see in the lives of the people of God throughout Scripture. Abraham expected God to deliver on his promise for a son. Israel prayed and waited expectantly for God to deliver them from Egypt. The wise men from the East looked expectantly at the night sky for the sign of the birth of the King of the Jews. The early Christians lived in daily expectation of the return of Jesus. We are called to do the same. May God help us to live expec-

tantly as we watch for his actions, follow his lead, and partner with him in his work to redeem and reconcile.

For the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation for all people, training us to renounce ungodliness and worldly passions, and to live self-controlled, upright, and godly lives in the present age, waiting for our blessed hope, the appearing of the glory of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ, who gave himself for us to redeem us from all lawlessness and to purify for himself a people for his own possession who are zealous for good works.
