Words of Welcome

Seeing the crowds, he went up on the mountain, and when he sat down, his disciples came to him. And he opened his mouth and taught them, say-

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kinadom of heaven.

"Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted.

"Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth.

"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied. "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive

"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God.

"Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heav-

"Blessed are you when others revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you. (Matthew 5:1-12 ESV)

"Good morning." "Welcome." "Glad you're here." "It's good to see you all." If you are a churchgoer, these are probably some of the things you hear from your preacher every Sunday. From the preach-

er's side, it seems only right to greet the congregation, thank them, let them know they are valued and appreciated. This is not just a practice for preachers by the way. It seems that any public address usually begins with some kind of welcome, but when we look at the preaching of Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount he seems to launch into the sermon without any preamble at all. He appears to launch directly into describing the type of people his followers ought to be.

But what if this is not what Jesus is doing with this part of the sermon. Could it be possible that Jesus is extending a welcome as he begins his sermon? Look at the opening verse of chapter 5, "Seeing the crowds..." Could it be that we have read this sermon and forgot about the crowds? We find their description in Matthew 4.

So his fame spread throughout all Syria, and they brought him all the sick, those afflicted with various diseases and pains, those oppressed by demons, those having seizures, and paralytics, and he healed them. And great crowds followed him from Galilee and the Decapolis, and from Jerusalem and Judea, and from beyond the Jordan. (Matthew 4:24-25 ESV)

The crowds! The sick, the demon possessed, the epileptics, the paralytics, those who were on the margins, the ones who are looking for hope, these are the folks in the congregation to whom Jesus preaches. These are people who may very well think that God has forgotten them. They may believe that there is just no way they can be included in the Kingdom. Yet, the first words they hear from Jesus are words of welcome. Not just, "Good morning." "Welcome." "Glad you're here." "It's good to see you all." But, "Welcome! The Kingdom of God is open to you!"

Do we see ourselves in the crowd? Haven't we been there? Are we there now? Aren't these words that we desperately long to hear? Aren't these — words of hope and welcome, words of good news — the words that people around us desperately need to hear? Please don't get me wrong. As followers of Jesus we ought to be humble (poor in spirit). We ought to mourn our sins and the conditions in which these sins have left us. We ought to be meek, long for the world to be made right, be merciful, pure in heart, peacemakers, you get the idea. We know that these characteristics are needed in our churches and in our homes. We can see how far short we often fall from these traits. Yet Jesus welcomes us into his Kingdom even in our broken, marginalized state.

We could learn a lot here. Sometimes, in our churches we get this backward. Sometimes we carry the message of the way people ought to be, the way people ought to live, or the ethics they ought to have before we let them know that they are welcome in the Kingdom. Of the many things we see in the life of Jesus that we should strive to imitate, being welcoming and inclusive is one we cannot neglect. Who do we know that needs to hear these words of welcome from Jesus? Who can we tell about the way in which Jesus welcomed us when we were broken and on the margins? Maybe the question isn't, "Who can we tell?" Maybe it is, "Who will we tell?"

Pretty outlandish! Right? A court-condemned thief, a sinner on his way to Hell, asking and receiving Heaven, a place in paradise. A sinner is swept through the Pearly Gates. What a crazy value system.

Anthony Campolo tells a story about some guys who broke into a department store and changed all the price tags. A \$612 sofa was \$40; a \$3000 boat motor was \$7.50; a \$350 shotgun was \$10; a \$3.00 paperback book was \$800. A \$30 blouse was \$900; they re-priced everything! Outlandish? Yes, but it was four hours into the business day before the store owners discovered the switch. Some got great bargains. Some felt cheated.

Today we have an outlandish value system. We see the most valuable sold for pennies and the cheapest smut goes for millions. A Bible sells for \$30. A smutty TV show is budgeted in the millions. We live in houses worth tens of thousands, drive a \$40,000 automobile and drop twenty, thirty dollars into the Lord's lap each week. A stockbroker trades his integrity to peddle inside information. A politician allows money to control his vote. A member of the church trades his influence for a place of honor or a moment of pleasure. Why do we take simple black and white issues and paint them gray? Why are priceless Bible truths traded for worthless human standards? Why do we elevate the body and degrade the soul? Why do we pamper the skin and pollute the heart? What causes this kind of outlandish behavior?

No Destiny. We have allowed Satan to convince us that we are headed nowhere. If the universe is a creator-less mass and life is an accident, then we have no future. Life becomes cheap and meaningless if we are all victims trapped on a mud heap called earth. Outlandish!!

No Duty. If no duty, then no obligation, no responsibility, no need for betterment, no goals, no upward movement.

No motive to be better than we are. So, a husband feels no obligation to support his wife and children; a mother has no pull toward family values. We can call a child a fetus and kill it. We can determine life is not worth living and take it. We can get loaded on chemicals until we're out of our mind. We can lie and steal to get ahead. No Worth. If we have no destiny, no duty, no truth, then we have no worth. Right? Wrong!! We have been purchased with a price: Not with silver and gold, but by the blood of God in the flesh. Jesus died to sanctify us, redeem us, justify and save us. He died to give us a destiny, duty, truth and value. We are twice His; once by creation, once by redemption. Outlandish!!

This is why: A lady taken in adultery is forgiven. A prodigal in a pigpen is welcomed home. A tax collector is forgiven and Jesus goes home with him. A thief on a cross is swept through the Pearly Gates.

This is why you and I can be saved. Outlandish!!
