Shaking Things Up

The most significant event in human history is the incarnation. Think of it. God desired a relationship with his creation badly enough to come here. It is a mind-boggling thought. With the coming of Jesus, the world will never be the same. For those in his day, life would never be the same. He was a threat to the status quo of his day. The powerful, the influential, the religious leaders sensed that the days of doing as they pleased and being revered and favored were coming to an end. We hear their fear as word of Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead spread among the people. "So the chief priests and the Pharisees gathered the council and said, 'What are we to do? For this man performs many signs. If we let him go on like this, everyone will believe in him, and the Romans will come and take away both our place and our nation."" (John 11:48)

He was an inspiration and a place of hope and refuge to those who followed him. Many recognized him as the fulfillment of the hope that had been promised. His followers knew there was something about this traveling rabbi that was vastly different to what they had seen previously. We can hear it in Peter's response to Jesus that we find in John 6. After many turned and gave up following him, Jesus said to the Twelve, "Do you want to go away as well?" Simon Peter answered him, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life, and we have believed, and have come to know, that you are the Holy One of God." (John 6:67-69)

After his death, resurrection and ascension, Jesus's followers continued his legacy of changing the world around them. From Peter's first sermon in Jerusalem and the birth of the church, to the continued growth of the church in Jerusalem, the conversion of the Samaritans at the preaching of Phillip, and the Gentiles becoming part of the Kingdom in Acts 10, we see that things will never be the same. The early Christians were accused of being those who "have turned the world upside down." (Acts 17:6)

As followers of Jesus we are called to make a difference in the world around us. We are called to see the world as it should be, to see the world the way in which God wants it to be and to engage. We, just like those early followers of Jesus, live in a world that desperately needs to change, and the only thing that brings lasting change is the Gospel. And, just like those early followers, we will experience opposition along with those who see Jesus as their hope and

refuge. It is not an easy path, but a necessary one.

It is tempting to retreat. It is tempting to cloister together and wait until trouble and opposition pass, to wait until he comes and calls us home. But we were meant for so much more. We are meant to be salt and light (Matthew 5:13-16). It is interesting that Jesus doesn't say, "You ought to be salt." or "You should be light." He says, "You are." He doesn't choose these images accidentally. These are both items that are only effective if they come in contact with other things. A flashlight is not noticeable on a sunny afternoon. Salt has no effect if it stays in the shaker.



We're called to make a difference. We're called to walk in the steps of the One whose coming changed everything. We lead lives that are under the lordship of Jesus. We do what he did. We love and seek the good for everyone, even our enemies. We trust the Father to ac-

complish his plans and purposes through our obedience. We order our lives around his commands and instructions. We do this openly, publicly, daily so that others will see that we are not the same because of his coming. Our prayer needs to be that God give us strength, focus, and boldness to live out our calling, as we follow the One who continues to shake things up.
