I'm so glad I learned to trust Thee, Precious Jesus, Savior, Friend, And I know that thou art with me, Wilt be with me to the end." This beautiful hymn was written by Louisa M.R. Stead in 1880. Se was born in Dover, England and moved to the U.S. in 1871 to Cincinnati. Ohio. She dedicated her life to missionary service, serving in Cape Colony, South Africa and later Zimbabwe. She married in 1875 and later had a daughter, Lily. Louisa had a major turning point in her life. The family decided to enjoy the sunny beach at Long Island Sound, New York. They were having a picnic lunch when they heard cries for help and spotted a drowning boy in the sea. Her husband, Kenneth went to help. The struggling boy pulled his rescuer under water with him before the terrified eyes of Louisa and her four-year-old daughter, Lily. Her husband and the boy he tried to rescue both perished. She wrote this hymn two years after the tragedy of her husband's death in dealing with her sorrow and why this happened. She found peace and comfort in trusting in Jesus, despite her sorrow. These meaningful words were written from the soul of Louisa Stead. To God Be the Glory!

Indeed, God is my salvation; I will trust Him and not be afraid, for the Lord, the Lord Himself, is my strength and my song. He has become my salvation. (Isaiah 12:2)

Being Neighborly I ran across a Facebook post from a friend of mine last week that really got my attention. The post described how he had lost guite a bit of hay to a fire. It wasn't just the tragedy and loss that got my attention. It was the way in which he expressed his appreciation for all of those who came to help, those who did what they could to prevent a total loss. It wasn't a rant against whomever or whatever started the blaze. Instead they were words of thanks for the many people who

were willing to be inconvenienced and sacrifice other things in order to lend a hand. There may be many words that come to mind to describe people who drop what they are doing, change plans, and serve those around them. One of the words that Jesus uses to describe such people is neighbor.

And behold, a lawyer stood up to put him to the test, saying, "Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?" He said to him, "What is written in the Law? How do you read it?" And he answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself." And he said to him, "You have answered correctly; do this, and you will live."

But he, desiring to justify himself, said to Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and

he fell among robbers, who stripped him and beat him and departed, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road, and when he saw him he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan, as he journeyed, came to where

he was, and when he saw him, he had compassion. He went to him and bound up his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he set



him on his own animal and brought him to an inn and took care of him. And the next day he took out two denarii and gave them to the innkeeper, saying, 'Take care of him, and whatever more you spend, I will repay you when I come back.' Which of these three, do you think, proved to be a neighbor to the man who fell among the robbers?" He said, "The one who showed him mercy." And Jesus said to him, "You go, and do likewise." (Luke 10:25-37)

There are a lot of things we could learn from this wellknown parable. Let's look at a couple of them.

The first thing we see is that the lawyer who poses the questions wants Jesus to define his neighbors. Jesus defines neighbor, but not the way the lawyer expected. In this parable, Jesus illustrates for us that we do not get to define our neighbors; we are called to be neighbors.

Sunday evening, July 17th, we listened to Jerry Morgan talk with us about the work in the Ukraine. When he was finished, we filled his trailer with the items that had been donated and still have quite a bit to send. We do not know those folks. We have never met them. We don't share much in common with them. However, this church, you all, sacrificed and gave. You demonstrated what it means to be a neighbor.

From the benevolence ministry, beds for kids, the food pantry, mission efforts, VBS, service week, as well as many other ways too numerous to list here, this congregation continues to demonstrate a love for neighbors. It is a beautiful thing to see. Don't ever lose that.

Secondly, it is interesting to me that Jesus says nothing in this parable about the response of the man who was injured. I think this is very instructive. We may never know the impact that our neighborly actions have on an individual. They may be incredibly grateful or seem completely unappreciative. We may feel as if they have taken advantage of us, of our generosity and sacrifice. We may never know. One thing of which we can be certain; being a neighbor makes us more like the One we follow. He is the ultimate demonstration of love for others, irrespective of who they are. Who knows? Being a neighbor may give us the opportunity to introduce them to Him, and that would be mighty neighborly.
