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Herod." (Mark 8:15) Jesus, then, corrected their misunderstanding of the signs he had already done which pointed to his identity. Then they encounter the blind man. Immediately after that, Jesus asked his disciples about his identity. It is here that Peter answers, "You are the Christ." (Mark 8:29)

The healing of the blind man serves as an object lesson illustrating the trouble that the disciples are encountering as they try to

And they came to Bethsaida. And some people brought to him a blind man and begged him to touch him. And he took the blind man by the hand and led him out of the village, and when he had spit on his eyes and laid his hands on him, he asked him, "Do you see anything?" And he looked up and said, "I see people, but they look like trees, walking." Then Jesus laid his hands on his eyes again; and he opened his eyes, his sight was restored, and he saw everything clearly. And he sent him to his home, saying, "Do not even enter the village." (Mark 8:22-26)

As we follow the life and ministry of Jesus, we see many extraordinary things that he does. He heals the lame, gives sight to the blind, cleanses lepers, casts out demons, feeds multitudes, calms the sea, and even raises the dead. Yet this particular incident recorded in Mark chapter 8 can be a bit puzzling. Does Jesus need two attempts to open the eyes of this blind man? Was Jesus just having an off day? Or, is there something else to which Jesus may be drawing our attention? Looking at the events immediately before and after this narrative may provide us with an idea of the point that is being made here.

Just prior to arriving in Bethsaida, Jesus had been engaged in another dispute with the Pharisees who were seeking more signs. Then the disciples misunderstood the warning of Jesus to "beware of the leaven of the Pharisees and the leaven of



figure out the identity of Jesus. They see something. They see a healer, a teacher, a provider, and a man with a specific mission. They see someone about whom there is something very unique, but are having trouble clearly making out the image just as the blind man did after Jesus touched his eyes the first time. But then, they see Jesus clearly. They see him for who he really is.

This little healing narrative that sometimes gets lost in the shadow of many of the other miracles of Jesus serves a reminder and as a challenge for us as his followers. It illustrates that we can spend time with Jesus and either fail to see clearly, or perhaps even to forget exactly who he is. Keeping our focus on him means remembering who exactly it is that we follow.

He is God in the flesh. We find this in several places in the New Testament. The author of Hebrews states this in Hebrews 1:3. "He is the radiance of the glory of God and the exact imprint of his nature, and he upholds the universe by the word of his power. After making purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high." Paul writes to the church in Colossae, "He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation." (Colossians 1:15) We also hear this same thing from the lips of Jesus himself. When asked by Phillip to show them the Father, Jesus replied, "Have I been with you so long, and you still do not know me, Phillip? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father." (John 14:9)

He is the one who exhibits God's great love for us. "In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent his only Son into the world, so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we have loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the propitiation for our sins." (1 John 4:9-10)

He is the one who has called us to follow him and to conform our lives to him. "And calling the crowd to him with his disciples, he said to them, 'If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake and the gospel's will save it." (Mark 8:34-35)

He is the one who will come again and set things right for the final time. Over and over in Scripture, we have the promise of his return. We hear him speak about the coming judgment and the reward for the faithful and punishment of the wicked.

Understanding his identity and keeping it firmly in our view is what enables us to live the life to which he has called each and every one of us. In all situations, in every circumstance and interaction with others, may we keep Jesus in clear focus and move in his direction.

People of Courage, Arise!

It was a daunting task from the beginning. It seemed destined for failure. When God called Ezekiel to prophesy to his fellow Israelites in exile, even He warned that it would be difficult and likely unsuccessful. God said, "The people to whom I am sending you are obstinate and stubborn ... and whether they listen or fail to listen – for they are a rebellious house – they will know that a prophet has been among them" (Ezekiel 2:4-5). He went on to prepare Ezekiel that it might feel like he was living among thorns and briars and scorpions, but "Do not be afraid of what they say or terrified by them, though they are a rebellious house. You must speak my words to them, whether they listen, or fail to listen (2:6).

God gave Ezekiel the words to speak. They were sweet, like honey, in his mouth (3:3). God sent him to his own people, people who could easily understand his message, not to people of obscure or difficult languages (3:5-6). Yet, even though they could easily understand the words, they would not listen to Ezekiel because they were unwilling to listen to God (3:7). When he finally got to the exiles at Tel Abib, all he could do was sit among them for an entire week – overwhelmed (3:15)!

I think we understand how Ezekiel felt, don't we? We hear stories about how the church is growing in places where we can't even speak their language; yet, right here at home the response is not much different than preaching to a brick wall! The message we have is the sweetest message ever told; yet because people are rebellious and obstinate, they no longer want to hear from us about God's grace because they no longer want to listen to God. It's frustrating. It's overwhelming. And so our tendency is to just sit around and keep our gospel to ourselves.

But that's not what God has called us to do. He has called us to take the gospel to the entire world whether they want to hear it or not (Matthew 28:19-20). We are to tell the gospel to people who may even respond with violent words or actions. Why? The answer is also found in Ezekiel's story. God told Ezekiel his responsibility was not to be successful, but to be faithful. As a watchman, he had to warn the people of God's coming judgment. He was not held accountable to the way the people responded to his warning, but he was accountable if he failed to warn the people (see 3:16-21).

To do this takes courage, lots and lots of courage. None of us want to teach people who are unwilling to listen. We'd much rather teach the willing, those with a heart for God. But God wants even the obstinate and unwilling to be given the opportunity to hear the gospel. Let's be people of courage who are willing to rise up and teach all people the message of God! -JOE CHESSER
