What Kind of Father?

Luke chapter 15 contains one of, if not the, most well known of the parables of Jesus, the parable of the Prodigal Son. This parable, as well as the two that immediately precede it, is told in response to those who believed Jesus to be a little too welcoming. Now the tax collectors and sinners were all drawing near to hear him. And the Pharisees and the scribes grumbled, saying, "This man receives sinners and eats with them." (Luke 15:1-2) In light of this, Jesus challenges his listeners to watch the actions of the older brother of the parable, while at the same time understanding our condition before God the Father. It is a beautiful story of love, mercy and grace, as well as our response to that grace that is extended to all.

The father in this parable, however, is often overlooked... at least one aspect of his character is rarely the focus. We have focused on his longing for his son. We have talked about his great grace and compassion. We have heard lessons and devotionals about the robe, the ring, the sandals, and the feast. But, have we stopped and thought about what we see in the character of the father early in the parable.

As Jesus begins this parable he speaks of the vounger son who wants his inheritance now, and a father that grants the request. What kind of father would do that? What kind of father gives his son something that he really doesn't deserve and quite possibly won't be able to handle correctly?

Surely there were signs. Surely there must have been indications that this young man couldn't be counted on to do the right thing. The request for the early inheritance clearly shows impatience and a lack of maturity. The only desire he has for the relationship with his father is for what the father can give to him. In asking for the early disbursement, he essentially tells his father, "I can't wait for vou to die. Give me all that I care aboutnow." How

could anyone be so unbelievably cruel to someone



who had provided for, cared for and sacrificed for him or her? What's more, how could a father, knowing the character of this morally lacking, immature, selfish, ungrateful son just hand over his share of the inheritance?

As we stop and think about this little section of this great parable, understanding God as the father, we get a glimpse into the heart of God. God, who made us in his image, who has given us life and blessed us in many, many ways, has given us free will. He allows us to have our way even if it is not what is best for us. He lets us go our own direction, even if that direction is away from him. He allows us freedom, even freedom to rebel, even though it breaks his heart. Like a parent that wants the best for his child and continually watches that child make poorer choice after poorer choice, God weeps over our rebellion.

We hear God calling out to his rebellious people, Israel, in many places throughout the Old Testament. It doesn't stop there. Just a few chapters from this parable, Luke records Jesus's lament over Jerusalem. And when he drew near and saw the city, he wept over it, saying, "Would that you, even you, had known on this day the things that make for peace! But now they are hidden from your eyes. For the days will come upon you, when your enemies will set up a barricade around you and surround you and hem you in on every side and tear you down to the ground, you and your children within you. And they will not leave one stone upon another in you, because you did not know the time of your visitation." (Luke 19:41-44)

This brings a question. If rebellion and suffering as a result are real possibilities, then why does he let us choose? God wants a relationship with humanity. But, he wants that relationship based on us choosing to love him. He wants us to freely choose him, understanding that he has loved us from the beginning, and has continually blessed us.

God wants us to "come to ourselves." He wants nothing more than for us to see how far we have traveled away from the image in which we were created, and to realize that we are not where we belong. He wants us to return to him. He watches, he waits, he yearns, and longs for our return. He wants us badly enough to send his son to make the way back to him so that we can be reunited with him; not only as servants, but as children with full family privileges.

Each and every day we have opportunities to choose to move closer or further away from him. He has done everything possible for us to continue to be a part of his family. Why would we want to move away from that kind of Father?
