In the Wilderness

If we do a Google search for wilderness images, we will find a lot of forests, rivers, and/or mountains. We see generally untamed areas. The dictionary defines wilderness as an uncultivated, uninhabited, and inhospitable region. It is a place where conditions can be harsh. It may be thought of as a place where resources are scarce, where danger lurks and a place of loneliness. For most of us, it probably doesn't sound like a place where we would want to be, especially on a longterm basis.

Yet in Scripture, there's quite a bit of time spent in the wilderness. Abraham was called from Ur to follow God through the wilderness to Canaan (Genesis 12). Moses spent decades as a shepherd for his father-in-law in the wilderness. God called him and sent him back to Egypt to lead Israel to Canaan, where Moses would spend the next 40 years in the wilderness (Exodus - Deuteronomy). When King David was just a kid, he spent time shepherding his father's sheep in the wilderness (1 Samuel 16 and 17).

When we come nearer to the time of the ministry of Jesus, we find John the Baptist in the wilderness preparing the way for Jesus. Jesus comes to the Jordan to receive baptism by John. The heavens are opened, the Spirit descends and God speaks, declaring that Jesus is His Son. Then the Spirit leads Jesus into the wilderness

where he fasts for 40 days and is tempted by Satan. Although the wilderness may not sound like a place where we would like to be, it seems quite a few significant things happen in the wilderness. Let's look at what we can expect to find there.

In the wilderness is where we learn to follow God's lead. Genesis 12:1 reads. "Now the LORD said to Abram, "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the



the land that I will show you."The only way Abraham would find his destination would be to follow God. When you and I answer the call of God, one of the first things we do is to submit to his leadership. We do this, not knowing where exactly he will lead us, but realizing the need for his leadership in our lives. We see where our own sense of direction has led us and realize that he is our only hope to make the change we need to make.

In the wilderness is where we learn to depend on God to provide. In Deuteronomy Moses recounts the events of Israel's journey from Egypt to Canaan. "And you shall remember the whole way that the LORD your God has led you these forty years in the wilderness, that he might humble you, testing you to know what was in your heart, whether you would keep his commandments or not. And he humbled you and let you hunger and fed you with manna, which you did not know, nor did your fathers know, that he might make you know that man does not live by bread alone, but man lives by every word that comes from the mouth of the LORD." (Deuteronomy 8:2-3) The 40-year wandering taught Israel what it was like to depend on God. As we live in a broken and often inhospitable world we need to see God's provision, God's providence at work and learn to lean on him more each day.

In the wilderness we learn to look out for one another. Maybe one of the most well known Bible narratives is the battle between David and Goliath. When David offered to go fight Goliath, King Saul tried to discourage and convince him of the danger that he would face. Listen to David's response in 1 Samuel 17:34-35. But David said to Saul, "Your servant used to keep sheep for his father. And when there came a lion, or a bear, and took a lamb from the flock, I went after him and struck him and delivered it out of his mouth. And if he arose against me, I caught him by his beard and struck him and killed him." As we learn to follow God's lead and watch for his provision in our own lives, we will also meet others trying to navigate life in the wilderness. We need to look our for their needs and serve as a safe place as we journey together.

In the wilderness we are reminded that the King is on his way. As we encounter John the Baptist in the wilderness his role is to prepare the people for the coming King. That King, our King, Jesus came and ministered. He came and lived and died and was resurrected. He came and defeated Satan in the wilderness and at the tomb, and at all points in between. Here in the wilderness we see the example that he has set for us, we pray for his return and we are reminded of the victory that we have because of what the King has done for us.

May God bless us as we live here in the wilderness.

Evaluating Our Spiritual Progress

"Continue to work out your salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who works in you to will and to act according to his good purpose. Do everything without complaining or arguing, so that you may become blameless and pure, children of God without fault in a crooked and depraved generation, in which you shine like stars in the universe as you hold out the word of life." (Philippians 2:12-16)

We all need to take account from time to time of where we are, how far we have come and where we are headed. There are all kinds of criteria for such evaluations: businessmen look at profits and losses; radio and television stations use Arbitron and Neilson ratings; ranchers look at adjusted weaning weights of their calves; poultry people figure feed conversion and mortality rates. Today we measure our weight and our bank accounts - but all too often we never measure our progress as God's people. What are some signs of spiritual maturity, kingdom faithfulness?

Paul says we are to work out our salvation. Are we making any progress" We are either growing or dying; either moving closer to being what God wants us to be, or we are moving away from Him. There is no middle ground. Jesus denounces the lukewarmness in His letter to the church at Laodicea. Christianity is an add-on religion . Make every effort to add to your faith, goodness; and to goodness, knowledge; and to knowledge, self-control; and to self-control, perseverance; and to perseverance, godliness; and to godliness, brotherly kindness; and to brotherly kindness, love. For if you possess these qualities in increasing measure, they will keep you from being ineffective and unproductive. Spiritual maturity, kingdom faithfulness is a continual process.

With humility. Work out your own salvation with fear and trembling. Pride says, I can do it myself, I can do enough good works to earn my salvation. Some of us in this church are worn out, ready to quit. Others have already quit because they're trying to be good enough and do enough good works to get to heaven. Stop! This kind of thinking will only frustrate us. Good people are not going to heaven! Forgiven people are going there. Paul said, Jesus humbled Himself and took on the very nature of a servant. Are we willing?

Without murmuring and complaining. A third sign of progress is learning to live without complaint. God hates our overlooking his daily blessings only to focus on what we don't like in life. The Israelites were condemned during their wilderness wandering because they murmured - even though God led them, fed them with manna, provided them with water, and kept their clothes and sandals from wearing out. Are we guilty of such dissatisfaction with His daily presence, promises, and blessings? Spiritual maturity is found in *praising* God instead of asking Him for more and more and more.

Maintaining moral purity. We are to be blameless and pure, children of God without fault in a depraved world. Scripture teaches us that we have a dual nature, flesh and spirit. Spiritual maturity is found in how we control these two battling forces within us. So I say, live by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the flesh. For the flesh nature desires what is contrary to the Spirit, and the Spirit what is contrary to the flesh. They are in conflict with each other. The acts of the flesh are obvious......But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.....Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit.

Influencing others. The great commission is for each and every child of God. Each of us can and must *go into all the world...Our world...* exemplifying Christ. Each of us must show others the way of life that leads to eternal salvation *as we shine like stars in the universe, holding out the word of life.* Paul is promoting life-style evangelism. Some may not be able to teach or preach, but each and every one of us can let Jesus be seen in us.

How do we measure up? Let's stop and evaluate our spiritual progress, and then make the appropriate adjustments.
