I May Be Slow, But.....

Several weeks ago, I asked a guy at church how he was doing. He replied, "I may be slow, but I make a lot of mistakes!" I probably find these kinds of Southern turns of phrases funnier than they are. Welcome to the Ozarks. The phrase popped into my head last week when I was climbing a pile of large rocks. I had thrown my keys on a rock just out of reach for safe keeping while playing with my son. When we got ready to leave, I went to grab them. Climbing up I thought, "I'll do this slow so I don't fall." One of the rocks rolled out from under my foot and fell to the ground in slow motion. On my way I thought, "I may slow, but I make a lot of mistakes!" And, man, if that doesn't describe my Christian life as well at times.

Have you ever handled a situation wrongly or succumbed to a temptation and thought, "next time I'll slow down so I don't do that again?" The next time you see the same situation or temptation you remember how it went last time so you pause and think to yourself, "slow down, pay attention. Don't let this turn out like it did last time." May be a split second later you are looking at the same bad outcome... again. It happens to me more than I'd like to admit.

The number of places we could relate this idea of being slow and making a lot of mistakes



to Jesus' disciples is almost endless. Peter, in particular, comes to mind.

And when they had sung a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives. Then Jesus said to them, "You will all fall away because of me this night. For it is written, 'I will strike the shepherd, and the sheep of the flock will be scattered.' But after I am raised up, I will go before you to Galilee." Peter answered him, "Though they all fall



away because of you, I will never fall away." Jesus said to him, "Truly, I tell you, this very night, before the rooster crows, you will deny me three times." Peter said to him, "Even if I must die with you, I will not deny you!" And all the disciples said the same. (Matthew 26:30-35)

Jesus tells him that he will deny his Lord three times before rooster crows in the morning. Jesus' prophecy comes true – you can't say Peter didn't see it coming. As Peter is waiting in the courtyard outside where the high priest had Jesus on trial, he is confronted three times about his association with Jesus and three times, Peter denies that he knows the One on trial. Then the rooster crowed, reminding Peter of Jesus' words, and causing him to weep bitterly (Matt 26:69-75). It's a train wreck happening in slow motion. You know it's coming, and yet the emotions it evokes in Peter and in us are real and difficult to process. It's slow, but it's a big mistake. But you've probably heard the good news ending of this story. In his post-resurrection appearance to Peter, Jesus and Peter are reconciled.

When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." He said to him, "Feed my lambs." He said to him a second time, "Simon,

son of John, do vou love me?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; vou know that I love you." He said to him, "Tend my sheep." He said to him the third "Simon, time, son of John, do vou love me?" Peter was arieved because he said to him the third "Do you time, love me?" and he said to him, "Lord, you know



everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep. Truly, truly, I say to you, when you were young, you used to dress yourself and walk wherever you wanted, but when you are old, you will stretch out your hands, and another will dress you and carry you where you do not want to go." (This he said to show by what kind of death he was to glorify God.) And after saying this he said to him, "Follow me." (John 21:15-19)

There is grace even though Peter committed a sin he should have seen coming. More good news: the same is true for you. We may be slow, but we make a lot of mistakes. Grace covers.
